**Alleluia, Christ is risen! God acts,
Alleluia!**



We made our journey through the days of Holy Week, culminating with a celebration for Easter Day. What a joyous day it was for the parish family and our guests! I want to thank everyone who helped to make such a day possible. With its inclusion of Ascension Day and the Day of Pentecost, we give thanks and praise during these fifty days of Eastertide that Christ is risen, sin and death have been vanquished, and we acknowledge God's power in life. We have nothing to fear!

Dietrich Bonhoeffer enlightens us with this quote about the greater purpose of life: Impending Resurrection: We pay more attention to dying than to death. We're more concerned to get over the act of dying than to overcome death. Socrates mastered the art of dying; Christ overcame death as the last enemy. There is a real difference between the two things; the one is within the scope of human possibilities, the other means resurrection. It's not from *ars moriendi*, the art of dying, but from the resurrection of Christ, that a new and purifying wind can blow through our present world. Here is the answer to Archimedes' challenge: "Give me somewhere to stand, and I will move the earth." If only a few people really believed that and acted on it in their daily lives, a great deal would be changed. To live in the light of resurrection – that is what Easter means.

The gospel passage on Easter Day from John 20:1-18 articulates the characteristics of living in the light of resurrection – a declaration that the final enemy has been defeated.

The part that love plays in this narrative is important. The love Mary Magdalene had for Jesus. She was the first to arrive at the tomb that morning because she could no longer stay away. Peter and John loved him, too. Each one of them had a unique resurrection moment. John became the first person to believe in the resurrection. To Mary belongs the glory of being the first person to see the Risen Christ.

There, too, is the love expressed by Jesus for his disciples and for the commitment to fulfilling the will of God. And we realize the love God has for humanity and all of creation by raising Jesus to new life. In the New Testament we are reminded that the event of the resurrection is not expressed as Jesus rising, as something conducted on his own, but as Jesus being raised or as God raising him. It is stressed to us that the event of the Resurrection is a powerful act of God – an act of Divine Love.

Ultimately, we are reminded of God's action in our life and in the world. When we are down and out, God acts. When life is dead, God acts. To understand this is to gain the foundation to the whole idea of our faith and spiritual life. The sting of death is no more, and we are given a promise of life eternal in the presence of our Creator.

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Bishop Franklin's Farewell Letter: April 2, 2018

Dear friends,

The big day has nearly arrived. On Sunday afternoon at a special service at St. Paul's Cathedral, I will pass the crozier to Bishop Sean Rowe and retire as your bishop. It will be a bittersweet day for me, because my heart will be full of thanksgiving for our ministry and joy at what we have accomplished, but I will also be sad that our time together is finished so soon.

From the beginning of my time as your bishop, I have worked to be active in our parishes, relating closely to you and encouraging your ministry. All of our congregations are precious, and I have been grateful to help nurture the seeds of new life that you have planted in so many places. We have been especially successful at recruiting outstanding clergy to join us in Western New York, and their leadership will help sustain the vitality I see in so many congregations for years to come.

My episcopate has coincided with the resurgence of Buffalo, and together we have created outreach and social justice ministries that are helping to foster the economic renewal of the region and care for

those who have been left behind. I am particularly proud of our work toward racial reconciliation, which has been made possible by the wisdom and faithfulness of many African American leaders, several of whom also serve the wider church as members of Executive Council and deputies to General Convention. We have taken an active role in the Racial Equity Roundtable, and have partnered with African American clergy leaders in other traditions to foster racial healing and end systemic racism. We have also begun the long journey of healing and reconciliation with our Native American community, and I am especially grateful to the people of Good Shepherd, Irving, who have helped me to see and understand the place of Native American people in our church and our communities.

In the same spirit of reconciliation, our support for same-sex marriage and care for LGBTQ people has helped the Episcopal Church move forward despite some difficult times in our denomination. We Episcopalians support full inclusion not in spite of our faith, but because of it, and I am proud that we are known in our communities for welcoming all of God's children.

Our greatest accomplishment together may be this: In the spirit of Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, a son of our diocese, we have become unafraid to talk about Jesus. I served on the Joint Nominating Committee to Elect a Presiding Bishop in 2015 when Presiding Bishop Curry was elected, and I have been so proud to be a diocesan bishop under his leadership. His commitment to the Jesus Movement and the Way of Love continue to help me and all of us speak unapologetically about our faith and its power in our lives and communities.

Our years together have been a time of change, and our efforts to face it with courage and excitement have culminated in your historic decision to explore a partnership with the Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania and to choose Bishop Sean Rowe as your bishop provisional. Your willingness to embark on this adventure means that I am leaving with a sense of hope and excitement about your future.

Serving as your bishop has been one of the great joys and privileges of my life. My love for you and for Buffalo and this region will stay with me forever. As I embark on my own next chapter—where I will serve as assisting bishop in the Diocese

of Long Island, teach at Episcopal Divinity School at Union, and continue my churchwide service as vice chair of the Board of the Archives, chair of the Task Force to Coordinate Ecumenical and Interreligious Work, and as a member of the House of Bishops Theology Committee—you can be sure that you will have my prayers and full support for all that lies ahead.

May the blessing and peace of God, Father, the Son, and Holy Spirit, be upon you, and remain with you forever.

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Trinity Episcopal Church Vestry Minutes March 19, 2019 As approved at the April Meeting

Present: Emily Ivey, Sr. Warden; Melisa Eichmann, Jr. Warden; Doreen Gould; Lucy Bryant; Jack Torrance; Sue Torrance; Virginia Becker; the Reverend James Clement, Rector; James Ivey, Treasurer.

Excused: Cathy Berner and William Roberts.

Opening Prayer: The meeting held in the parish hall opened with prayer at 6:01 p.m.

The Meeting Agenda was approved as given.

Approval of Minutes: A motion was made by Lucy Bryant with a second by Sue Torrance to approve the minutes of the February 19, 2019 meeting. The motion carried.

Committee Reports

Finance: James Ivey reported.

A motion was made by Sue Torrance with a second by Lucy Bryant to receive the treasurer's report. The treasurer's report was received as submitted and reported.

- At the end of February, 21% of stewardship pledges have been received.
- Discussion was had with regard to the various budget line item/accounts for Choir and Masterworks Choir.
- It was suggested that budget line item #6011-Supply Organist be increased for 2020 budget.

Memorial Fund Report: Virginia Becker reported.

- The balance continues to stand at \$4,288.18.

Buildings and Grounds: Melisa Eichmann reported.

- Lee Blackburn, Melisa Eichmann, and Fr. Clement met to discuss the renovation of the church balcony. Several matters were discussed, including the raising of balcony railing, storage, cleaning, and new seating,

as well as railing for the upper stairwell. Only a few of the wooden pews are salvable. Vestry agreed that Lee Blackburn should begin work as soon as the weather temperatures get warm. Discussion of raising the balcony railing deferred to Old Business.

- A planned meeting was had with a local electrician regarding lighting needs for the building facilities. Vacanti Electric submitted specifications and estimate for the following work: Install LED motion light at the parking lot entrance into Garland Hall; install LED light bulbs throughout the church – nave, choir, baptistry; install LED up-lighting over the choir stalls; install LED lighting in the Choir with dimmer switch; install a motion switch in hallway leading to downstairs parish hall; install new fixtures in narthex and stairwell. The total estimate for this work is \$3,700.00. Jack Torrance suggested obtaining a copy of installer's insurance for record. Doreen Gould made a motion with a second by Emily Ivey to accept this bid from Vacanti Electric and have the work conducted. The motion carried.

Caregivers: Sue Torrance reported.

- It was reported that all is well. Additional cards will be acquired soon for the continuation of this ministry.

Outreach: Emily Ivey reported.

- The March and April outreach for the collecting of canned vegetables for the local food pantry continues.

Trinity Episcopal Church Women: Doreen Gould reported.

- At February meeting it was decided to have the spring rummage sale one weekend in May, most likely May 3rd and 4th.
- Tea at the Episcopal Cottage in Chautauqua will be on July 16th.
- TECW will donate \$600.00 to Partners in Kind organization. Items not sold at the rummage sale will be donated to this organization.

Flower Guild: Melisa Eichmann reported.

- Currently, there is \$744.56 in the account. Activity since the last meeting:

- A payment of \$100.00 was made to Fresh and Fancy Florist.
- The sign-up sheet and dedication forms for Easter flowers are located in Garland Hall.

Rector's Report:

- Fr. Clement stated that the Ash Wednesday services went well.
- He attended the February meeting of Diocesan Council in Buffalo.
- He reminded vestry of the potluck dinner in Bishop Franklin's honor will be held at St. Luke's Church, Jamestown, Saturday, March 23.
- Bishop Franklin Fund: Emily Ivey made a motion with a second by Jack Torrance to take \$100.00 from the Discretionary Account (Budget line item #6093) and send to this fund. The motion carried.
- Sunday, May 12, is the designated day for the U.T.O. Ingathering at Trinity. Lisa Sedlmayer, Parish U.T.O. Coordinator, has been contacted.
- The parish has signed a new building use agreement with the Saturday Sewing Group.

Old Business:

Balcony railing: Discussion continued with regard to raising the church balcony railing.

- Melisa Eichmann made a motion seconded by Doreen Gould to approve work to be conducted by Lee Blackburn. This includes the installation of iron pipe and brackets on top of the existing wooden balcony railing, which will extend the length of the existing railing from side-wall to side-wall. When completed, the new height of the balcony railing will be three feet. The motion carried.

Hillside Painting: Emily Ivey reported.

- Hillside Painting presented a bid in the amount of \$2,800.00 for completion of exterior work to be done on the sanctuary windows, front window, and front doors of the church. Ginny Becker moved to approve and seconded by Sue Torrance. The motion carried.
- Sue Torrance asked for a majority vote to approve of the new color currently painted on the front window of the church. Hillside painting is to apply a second coat of paint,

as per the bid. Majority members approved to remain with the current color for the front window.

Window Restoration: Emily Ivey reported.

- A committee from the vestry was formed to implement plans for the dedication plaques for the restored windows located in the church. This committee will have its initial meeting on Sunday, March 24. Persons on this committee are: Sue Torrance, Jack Torrance, Emily Ivey, Lucy Bryant, and Doreen Gould.

New Business:

Town of Pomfret: Fr. Clement reported.

- Allison Dispense, Town Clerk of Pomfret, contacted Fr. Clement with regard to the hedge row located in the front churchyard adjacent to the Town Hall parking lot. The growth of the hedge row impedes the use of a needed parking space. The Town requests from vestry permission for a plan to remove the hedge row. A different variety of plant material will be placed along the property-lot line. This work will be conducted at no cost to the parish. Lucy Bryant made a motion with a second by Emily Ivey to support this plan and requesting that the new planting be at least three-feet in height. Fr. Clement will continue conversation with the Town Clerk. The motion carried.

GCI Communications: Fr. Clement reported.

- Fr. Clement recently met with Matthew Weaver of CGI Communications, Rochester, New York. This particular business and the Village of Fredonia are working together on a project for the Village website. Mr. Weaver gave several options to the parish relating to this project. Fr. Clement presented one of these options to vestry, consisting of a weblink to be present on the Village website. The fee for this weblink is \$1700.00 per year. After conversation, vestry made the decision to decline such a plan. Vestry believes this expense is better utilized by being directed towards a new parish website.

2019 Holy Week Schedule: Fr. Clement reported.

- In consultation with vestry, Fr. Clement presented the Holy Week worship schedule. This schedule includes the various services offered for Palm Sunday and during the Triduum. There will be one service on Easter Day at 9:30 a.m., allowing for the entire congregation and guests to worship together. The Children's Easter Egg Hunt and coffee hour will follow this service. Melisa Eichmann, Ginny Becker, and Emily Ivey will bring the baked goods for coffee hour.

Relocation of the Ivey Family: Emily Ivey reported.

- Emily Ivey announced that she and Jim Ivey are moving their residence outside of the State of New York. Their plan is for this move to occur within the coming few months. Emily and Jim Ivey will resign as officers of this vestry, effective June 1, 2019.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:02 p.m. with a motion made by Doreen Gould.

Father Clement offered a closing prayer.

The next meeting will be held Tuesday, April 23, 2019 at 6:00 p.m. (*Note date change due to Holy Week*)

Vestry Minutes – Special Meeting
April 14, 2019

On Wednesday, April 10, a call was issued by the Rector and the Wardens for a special meeting of Vestry on Sunday, April 14, to be held at the Church. The purpose of this meeting was for discussion of the approval and financing of an agreement with Future Buffalo Website Design, Buffalo, New York.

Present: Emily Ivey, Sr. Warden; Melisa Eichmann, Jr. Warden; Lucy Bryant, Doreen Gould, Virginia Becker, William Roberts, the Revd. James Clement, Rector.

Excused: Cathy Berner, Sue Torrance, and Jack Torrance.

The meeting was **called to order** at 12:14 p.m.

Fr. Clement thanked those who were present for attending the meeting. Fr. Clement reported that his work of creating a new and updated website for the parish has not been successful, due to several reasons. He stressed the importance of the parish having an updated and purposeful presence on the Web.

While researching help from the greater community he discovered Future Buffalo, a company that works with businesses and organizations to develop websites and social-media platforms. Fr. Clement is aware of this company's work with other organizations. He recently met with Jeffrey Enabe, Founder of Future Buffalo. After their conversation together, Future Buffalo issued a proposal to Trinity Church for web-design, maintenance, and security, which was presented to Vestry.

Six main needs are given in the proposal: to redesign the church's website so that others can quickly and easily access the latest news and events for Trinity Church; create a warm, welcoming website that expresses the parish's mission; the user can access the service on desktop, tablet, and mobile devices – responsive and functional; easy to add news and events; embedded Google Calendar; and, Social Media Integration. The process with Future Buffalo will take 7-8 weeks.

The total expense of this agreement is \$3,200.00, with \$2,000.00 due at signing and \$1,200.00 due at project launch. In consultation with the Parish Treasurer, Fr. Clement suggested that the majority of this expense be covered by parish budget line items that will not be used in 2019 under the section, Rector Expense.

Vestry discussed the proposal, as well as matters relating to the current parish website. Suggestions were offered for a new website and design. Co-Treasurer, Virginia Becker confirmed the availability of funds for this project. William Roberts asked Fr. Clement for confirmation that the budget line items will not be needed this year.

Emily Ivey made a motion and seconded by Virginia Becker for the parish to enter into an agreement with Future Buffalo, the down payment derived from budget line items under Rector

Expense, and Fr. Clement to work with Jeffrey Enabe. The motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:44 p.m. with a motion made by William Roberts.

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Memorial Stained-glass Windows

We continue with the series each month of learning about the individuals the church windows were dedicated to when first installed in 1925. This biographical information is provided to us by Lisa Sedlmayer.

The West Window – North Side: This window, in memory of “Dr. and Mrs. M. M. Fenner” depicts scenes of *Marriage at Cana, Jesus at Bethany, Feeding the Multitude, and Stilling the Tempest.*

Dr. Milton M. Fenner

Milton M. Fenner was born July 28, 1837 in Stockton, the son of Christopher C. and Lucina Fross Fenner. Dr. M. M. Fenner was married twice. He married first on June 5, 1866 in Jamestown, NY to Louisa Georgina Grandin (1842-1881). They had no children. On March 28, 1883 in Fredonia, he married Florence E. Bondeson (1860-1922). His only child, Milton Marion Fenner, Jr., (1887-1980) was born of this marriage. Dr. Fenner died March 14, 1905 in Fredonia.

M. M. Fenner inherited the seemingly untiring energy of his mother, the ambition and strong integrity and strict honesty of both parents. He attended Alleghany College in Meadville, PA and graduated from Medical College in Cincinnati, OH, with a degree of M.D. on May 22, 1860. He was a veteran of the Civil War, serving as a private in Company A, 8th Michigan Regiment and was appointed Hospital steward, rapidly rising through the ranks being commissioned as a first lieutenant.

After the war, he established a prosperous business of manufacturing: People’s Remedies, now controlled by a corporation called the M. M. Fenner Co. In all his varied careers, he had the confidence and esteem of all with whom he associated. He started as a farmer lad, without assistance, he won his own way to honorable positions and large wealth. Dr. Fenner’s life here has been a great benefit to Fredonia and we shall not soon see his equal in enterprise, courage, public spirit and business ability.

Florence E. Bondeson Fenner

Florence Bondeson Fenner was born August 19, 1860 in Warren Co. PA but spent her childhood in Jamestown. She was the daughter of John P. and Charlotte Gelm Bondeson. On March 28, 1883, she married Milton Fenner. Her only child was Milton Marion Fenner, Jr. Florence Fenner died at her home, 178 Central Avenue, Fredonia, on December 22, 1922.

Mrs. Fenner became prominent in the social affairs of Dunkirk and Fredonia and was most highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends. She was a member of the Art Club, a former member of the Shakespeare Club and belonged to Trinity Episcopal Church. Mrs. Fenner also took a deep

interest in the Dr. M. M. Fenner Camp, Sons of Veterans, which was named for her husband. Her charming personality and gracious manner endearing her to all.


